

By George! They've really got it! A great big first class hit, that is. "My Fair Lady", which opened on stage at Front Street Theatre Thursday, September 24th, is a delightful blend of George Bernard Shaw's "Pygmalion" and Lerner and Loewe's marvelous songs.

Front Street's production displays every bit of the color, excitement, and lively hunor the play suggests. The scenery and costumes are outstanding, and set the proper mood for this superb musical. The dance sequences are unusually good, and the acting is excellent,

Paxton Whitehead as the arrogant Henry Higgins commands the stage with his beautiful British accent, while June Helmers, Eliza Doolittle, follows closely screeching the vile sounds proper to the cockney dialect. This pair are well supported by Macon McCalman as the jolly Colonel Pickering and Richard Sanders as the rowdy Alfred P. Doolittle.


